## Preparing for Your Child's IEP Meeting



- 1. **Obtain and review important documents:** Before the Individualized Education Program (IEP) meeting, make sure you have your child's current IEP and recent evaluations. Read these documents to better understand your child's educational needs.
- 2. **Reflect on your child's progress:** Think about how your child has grown and improved in the past year. Make a list of these achievements to share at the meeting.
- 3. **Identify your concerns:** List your primary concerns for the upcoming school year and IEP meeting. Rank these concerns in order of importance.
- 4. Assess your child's current abilities and needs:
  - Consider how your child's disability affects their learning.
  - List your child's strengths.
  - Identify learning opportunities for your child.
  - Think about what your child needs to learn next.
  - Determine if current evaluations are sufficient or if more are needed. Be ready to request additional evaluations if necessary.
  - Envision your child's progress in each goal area for the next year.
- 5. **Prepare questions:** Write down any specific questions you want to discuss at the IEP meeting.
- 6. **Suggest goals and objectives:** List any goals or objectives you believe should be included in your child's IEP.
- 7. Other factors to consider:
  - Communication between you and the school
  - Accommodations and modifications
  - Extended School Year (ESY) services
  - Behavior management
  - Social and communication skills development
  - Related services (e.g., speech therapy, occupational therapy)
  - State/district assessment participation
  - Extracurricular and non-academic activities
  - Transition planning
- 8. **Review the draft IEP:** Request a copy of the school's draft IEP before the meeting. Read it carefully and note any questions or concerns you have.
- 9. **Create an agenda:** Plan what you want to discuss at the IEP meeting and the desired outcome. Being prepared helps you advocate effectively for your child.
